
NOTES from Billy Buza and Pat Hoffman

FIELD TRIP TO BAY CITY, TX from Audrey Leger-Wright



On August 2nd, twenty of the Houston Deaf Senior Citizens including an interpreter, Basil Reyna, had a field trip to Bay City, TX. The group toured the historic railroad and children's museum, Matagorda County Museum. After lunch at K-2 Steak House, the popular restaurant in Bay City, the Senior Citizens toured the largest nuclear plant, South Texas Project Electric Generating Station. There are only two (2) nuclear plants in Texas, which are in Bay City and Glen rose.

Sheila Ormond, the tour guide from the Vista Center, explained and showed videotape about that plant before taking us to a bus to tour the plant. There's a lake by

the plant called Plant Cooling – 45 feet deep and 7,000-acre reservoir, the largest man-made, above-ground reservoir in the world. Water is drawn into the lake from Colorado River. The Owners of that plants are Austin Energy – 16%, Central Power & Light – 25.2%, City Public Service of San Antonio – 28%, and Reliant Energy-HL&P – 30.8%. Electric power to Austin, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Houston and surrounding areas comes from the plant. Wow! That's amazing and very interesting! On our way back home we stopped by Dairy Queen to have *ICE CREAM!* Overall, the trip was enjoyable.

NEWS from DeafDigest:

The obituary page of the Washington Post, July 27th edition mentioned the passing of Joseph H. Ziglinski, 85, a retired military officer and a professional hypnotist. During the seventies he teamed up with *James Casey*, a deaf man, to give demonstrations of how hypnotism worked with the deaf. The late Lee Brody, a former heavy smoker, has always credited these Ziglinski-Casey hypnotic sessions for helping him quit smoking. For some reason the deaf hypnotic programs never took a foothold in the deaf community.

A COMMENT FROM A HARD OF HEARING MOTORCYCLE INSTRUCTOR



Louis F. Caplan of Northern Virginia, who is hard of hearing and a motorcycle safety instructor, has to say about earplugs.

He said "When I teach the Motorcycle Rider Course to hearing people I encourage them to wear earplugs. Most earplugs are not noise-proof but are geared to specific decibel ranges. I wear earplugs when I ride to protect what hearing I have left, yet while wearing

them I still can hear a siren or horn honking when nearby. It blocks engine sounds, but it is the wind noise that causes most hearing damage in riders, regardless of helmet."

He also said "I still get comments such as 'you ride a motorcycle, but you're deaf."

OUR WHALES AND THE NAVY'S SONAR PROGRAM



Are our whales becoming deaf? This is not a joke. There are concerns that the continued US Navy's continued testing of their sonar program underseas would cause deafness in whales that swim nearby.

Said one environmental protester "noise is billions of times more intense than that known to disturb whale migration and communication. Whales and dolphins depend on their sensitive hearing for survival. To put it simply, a deaf whale is a dead whale."

Sonar, by the way, is used to sniff out enemy submarines.

Deaf History

James Howe 1780-1836

He began drawing in margins and on scrap paper and went on to become Scotland's first animal painter.

In 1815, when the British finally defeated Napoleon at Waterloo, they needed a painter to immortalize the great battle. They decided to hire James Howe, Scotland's famous artist, who had been deaf as long as anyone could remember. Howe visited the battlefield where so many men had died, and painted the battle scene vividly on a huge canvas. Today it is one of his most famous paintings.



Howe always loved to draw. When he was a little boy, he drew on every piece of paper he could find. Sometimes when his father, a minister, pulled out his papers to read his sermons at church on Sunday morning, he found James's drawings decorating the edges of his papers.

James drew everything~people, flowers, tools. But mostly he drew animals. He tried to go to school. For a while, he went to the village school in Skirling, near his home, but he quit when he was still young. He was deaf and could not understand his teacher or the other students in the small class.

At 14, he got his first opportunity to paint for money. He joined a group of house painters as an apprentice. But Howe preferred artistic painting. He quit painting houses and began to paint portraits. Finally he set up his own studio.



Then one day he painted a pony and hung it in his window. People were fascinated with the painting. The pony looked so real, almost as if it were alive. People began to ask Howe to paint other animals. Britain's Board of Agriculture asked him to paint different breeds of cattle.


When Howe died in 1836, he was famous as Scotland's first and perhaps its greatest animal painter.
