At our regular March meeting, we had our favorite police officer, James Sobota, discuss ATM Safety. Hurrah!

He said we might not notice that someone could be watching you when you walk up to an ATM or in your car. However, they may want your money after you withdraw. So

here are some tips to follow to make this errand safer.

- The favorite time of the day for bad guys to attempt ATM theft is the afternoon
- If at night, go only to an ATM in a lighted area.
- Sometimes a bad guy may try to act friendly or need something, but he is only trying to get close and may have a hidden gun. If this ever happens to you, give him what he wants. Your life is far more critical than your cash, no matter how much.
- Try to notice your surroundings. Don't be busy on your phone.

- Sometimes a thief may try to use their car to block yours, either in the
 parking lot or as you are driving away. If someone is doing this, you
 may honk loudly to attract the attention of others and scare him away.
- Don't write the password on the ATM card jacket, the little envelope you save your ATM card in. (Debit card, too, if you have this.) Your stolen purse or wallet makes it too easy for the thief to get even more money from your bank account.
- Count your cash at home. Don't stop in public, including in front of the ATM, to count your money.
- If you must withdraw a large amount of cash, it is better to enter the bank than walk up to an ATM.
- Keep your ATM receipt. Please don't throw it away. Instead, shred it later at home.

Billy Buza shared his story of withdrawing \$1,500 in cash and then left it in the money envelope under his visor. He felt it was well hidden, and it was only a minute to stop by a convenience store for a snack. But, when he returned to his truck, the glass window was smashed everywhere, and his cash was gone.




Caribbean Cruise Feb 18 -23, 2022 — Costa Maya and Cozumel








Interesting Mayan culture details for both the cacao place and the next one, a bee sanctuary. Here are a few Mayan facts— The Mayans used a number system based on base 20, counting fingers and toes. They have two calendars that follow the sun and moon cycles. Cacao is ground up and mixed by pouring into bowls over and over. The bride and groom each make their cacao separately and then run their bowls together. This tradition is part of their weddings and funerals.

The bee sanctuary had tiny stingless bees, quite cute. They make less honey than the regular honeybee, but the taste was better. After all the tasting, we shopped at the local markets.







Day 6 – We arrived at Galveston the following day before the sun was up. Getting off was smooth. Shock after 82 degrees in Mexico, we needed winter coats. ha

Day 5—On ship all day! The best part of this day was an international team of excellent ice skaters who amazed us with the graceful moves they could do on skates.




