

Field Trip to Gonzales, TX from Audrey Leger-Wright:



On September 6th, twenty-five of the Houston Deaf Senior Citizens including an interpreter, Gladys Flores, had a field trip to Gonzales, TX. The group toured the Noah's Land Wildlife Park in Harwood near Gonzales, and rode through 275 acres to see rare and exotic animals. We were pleased to know that before the park owners have gotten more animals, some abused, now the recently added animals have access to therapy in their new home. They are planning to add more acres, make the ponds and add waterfalls, etc. to make the animals feel home.

After lunch we went down to Gonzales town and were amazed that this small town has lots of historic sites. First we went to Gonzales Memorial Museum. There are two separate rooms of in this museum. The first room was sights of the history of war before Alamo times, along with

rifles, uniforms, pictures and letters that the prisoners were written during jail time. The other room displayed bedroom furniture, sewing machine, butter maker, handmade dress, baptism dresses, and crystals. Then we toured the old log house called Eggleston House that was the first house built in Gonzales in 1845 which is furnished with antiques furniture. There are only two separate small rooms on the east and west sides between the breezeway with a full porch in the front under one completely covered roof. At the front, the west side room is a kitchen and the east side room is a bedroom. The thick timbers of the house were made from walnut and oak tree to protect from Indians and animals.

The last stop was the old jail building constructed in 1887 that was used as jail until 1975. We toured on the second story of small jail cell rooms and in the middle there was a stand for hanging criminals. Then we rode in the bus to see the historic houses with a tour guide that gave us a speech about old historic homes of famous people. In recent times people who bought these historic houses had remodeled them in the same old-fashioned way nothing was changed. That was amazing for sightseeing. There was some more, but we didn't have enough time. Though we enjoyed it, we were ready to go home. On our way home, we stopped by Dairy Queen for some *ice cream*.






"HENRY"

DIABETIC PINA COLADA CAKE

- Estee diet cake mix (yellow or white)
 can Dole unsweetened crushed pineapple
 (Save juice)
- 1 small box sugar-free instant Vanilla pudding
- 1 box sugar-free whipped topping

Mix cake mix as directed on the box and bake. Remove from the oven. Pour crushed pineapple and juice over warm layer. Mix Vanilla pudding as directed on the box. Mix until thick and pour over the pineapple. Use an envelope of the whipped topping and pour over pudding. Keep in the refrigerator. Better if made the night before. Use an 8X8" Pyrex dishes.

Deaf History

Sanzan Tani

This deaf and blind scholar became one of the greatest teachers in Japan.



In the mid-1800s, a young Japanese student carefully practiced writing invisible letters with his forefinger in the palm of his hand. He was on his way to meet a famous teacher, Sanzan Tani, one of the most learned men in Japan. Tani was deaf and blind and communicated with his students through touch.

Tani had become deaf when he was eight years old. He read a lot, and his father spent most of his money on books for his son. But young Tani never felt satisfied with his reading. He had so many

questions! Reading only lead to more questions.

When he grew up, Tani left his village home to look for a teacher to help him understand his questions about the great books. He traveled from town to town and questioned teacher after teacher. But his curiosity was never satisfied. Surprisingly, the teachers began to tell him that he knew more than the great books than they did. Even in Kyoto, the center of Japanese culture and learning, Tani seemed to know more about the great books than anyone else.

The government learned about Tani's brilliance and awarded him a teaching position. Tani taught for many years. As he taught, he lost his hearing and eyesight. He became deaf and blind.

Blind and deaf, Tani continued to teach. Students wrote their questions in the palm of his hand. Tani answered from memory. His mind was so powerful that he could tell the students where to read about their questions in the great books. He had the books filed away, page by page in his memory.
